Saving Baby Hannah

"Project Hannah is God's answer to prayer for many in Africa," says Macy Domingo, *Women of Hope* (WoH) producer for Ivory Coast. The African French WoH program began airing on local stations in summer 2007, as well as from TWR's new transmitter in Benin earlier this year. "God is doing so much healing and restoration," she adds.

During one of the first prayer groups in the country, the monthly prayer calendar topic was on abortion. Women gathered weekly for one hour to worship and pray, and many often invited neighbors and friends. One woman who attended the meeting said: "Thank you so much for inviting me. I'm a Christian, but life was so tough." She continued to share that she had gotten pregnant, but because her home life was so hard, she was not going to keep the baby. A friend gave her money to get medicine to induce an abortion and she tried it. But nothing happened.

"I was planning to go tomorrow [and get more medicine] and you just invited me today," she said. "I heard the will of God and decided not to do that again. Thank you so much for saving my life. I will keep the baby and trust God to help us." Today, they call her child "Baby Hannah."

The Ivory Coast ministry is one of several PH African outreaches. *Women of Hope* also airs in Angola, Mozambique and Liberia. Because of the decades of civil war in Angola and Liberia, basics such as running water, proper sanitation and electricity are nearly nonexistent. Medical assistance and schooling for children are for the privileged few. Life often is challenging, but praise God that women and families in these impoverished nations are discovering new hope in Christ through Project Hannah. "Thank the Lord for blessing us with PH and the *Women of Hope* program," a listener from Angola wrote. "Now I know where to direct my problems, needs, afflictions and difficulties. Because of that, I am strengthened daily."

Reaching Women in East Africa

Beginning this year, women in Ethiopia, Kenya and Tanzania will have the opportunity to hear Project Hannah's message of hope. According to the World Health Organization, many women in East Africa face great health challenges. The maternal death rate in the country is among the highest in the world. Since 35 percent of Ethiopian women are illiterate, radio is an ideal way to reach them with necessary information about health and other issues.

TWR's Norwegian partner, Norea Media Mission, already has been involved with PH since 2002, translating and distributing the monthly prayer calendar to 500 Norwegians and supporting *Women of Hope* (WoH) programs in Cambodia, Albania and Central Asia. Norea is currently working with TWR to broadcast *Women of Hope* in Ethiopia, Kenya and Tanzania. Since many in rural southern Ethiopia do not own radios, PH and Norea also would like to make a difference by distributing MegaVoices. These digital audio players are inexpensive and can be both solar and battery powered. Through MegaVoices, WoH programs and other important messages (such as from a local hospital) can be heard even in rural areas.

A Passion to Serve

"Statistics say that every sixth woman in Slovakia is abused, mainly [because of] domestic violence," says Lubomir Vyhnanek, director of Radio 7 Slovakia. "Many times this form of violence is hidden, and that's the reason we want to help, so that abused women won't be afraid to talk about their traumas and will look for a way out of their situation. We want them to know that through the gospel they can get to a new place of spiritual freedom."

In November 2007, Radio 7 Slovakia began weekly, 40-minute broadcasts of *Women of Hope* in the Slovak language. Behind this program is the creative team of Slovak women led by producer Lenka Zustiakova. Lenka was 11 when she committed her life to the Lord and dreamed of becoming a missionary. Her father, a Baptist pastor, was persecuted because of his faith on many occasions. "During the Communist regime in our country, we were active in our church. Once I was taken to the police station because they found a Bible in my purse," she says. "It wasn't pleasant, but I trusted the Lord."

Lenka studied journalism and has been writing for several years. When she was 23, she married a young doctor, who also

became an evangelist and pastor. Together with her husband and three children, Lenka serves the Lord.

"Ministering to women is my biggest passion," she says. "When I was given the opportunity by Radio 7 to prepare programs for women, my heart rejoiced.

"Ever since we started to air *Women of Hope*, we have received feedback from Slovak women expressing their thankfulness," adds Lenka, who hosts the broadcasts with her colleague Gabika. "They find it up-to-date and helpful for their daily lives. It is encouraging for me to know that, and gives me motivation for the upcoming programs that we are producing."

- Vital ministries in Asia, such as in Vietnamese and Burmese, continue to flourish because of your prayers and gifts.
- A Central Asian Russian (CARS) WoH began airing in January 2007, joining five other languages in the region. Praise God that most of these six programs are fully funded by donations from TWR European partners and individuals like you, enabling Central Asian women to hear of Christ's hope—perhaps for the first time.

In a country where women are still subject to cultural discrimination and violence, and female babies are killed or abandoned in preference for males, Project Hannah is God's agent of change to transform the lives of many Indian women from despair to hope. Two years ago, Project Hannah initiated *Women of Hope* (WoH) programming in Hindi; today the broadcast airs in seven major Indian languages thanks to funding by TWR European partners and donations from PH supporters.

The programs air over various broadcast outlets, including shortwave, medium wave (AM) and local FM stations, as well as via Internet and CDs and cassettes. The Project Hannah team in India also often visits listeners and churches and hosts conferences and listener rallies, on-the-ground ministries that strengthen the program's impact.

Project Hannah recently received a letter from a handicapped Indian listener. She and her husband have two children. She wrote and said that every evening, she dreaded her husband coming back home because he was violent against her and she had nowhere to turn. She even considered ending her life because she felt so hopeless.

One night, thinking she was going to commit suicide, she listened to music while waiting for the household to settle down. She chanced upon listening to Women of Hope in her language. The minute she heard it, she told PH, she felt something tug at her heart. She couldn't explain what happened, but she dropped the idea of ending her life, and listened to the program again the next week, and the week after. She committed her life to the Lord, started praying for her husband, and today he is also a believer. In her letter, she said she no longer dreads her husband coming home, and that God has transformed their family.

"Despite improvements for many women living in India, it is still common for those living in rural areas to believe that domestic violence is something they deserve to receive," says TWR-India CEO Vinita Shaw. "Praise God that through *Women of Hope*, He is teaching women and men that this is not truth."

Destination: Hope by Marli Spieker, Project Hannah founder and awareness advocate

How would you answer this listener's question? "Is there any hope for a woman like me who is poor, uneducated, does not have skills to find a job, who is very weak and not beautiful? I am almost in despair." Can you hear the PAIN in her words? She lives in an ungodly culture dictated by men who have no idea of her God-given destiny, value and purpose. Because of this ignorance, many people will misuse or abuse her and others like her. This dear woman not only lacks money, education and strength—she believes that she is worthless! Nobody ever told her that she is highly esteemed by her Creator, so much so that He sacrificed His Son for her. She has no sense of destiny and she's acquainted with hopelessness and pain.

Unfortunately, she is not alone. Even many sophisticated, Western women are disillusioned by success, education, social security and technology while thirsting for love, significance and hope. Indeed, it is not easy to be a woman in the 21st century. I have seen the pain in their eyes as they face life totally oblivious of their value. Pain, not hope, has become their destination.
