Hannah's Alexander Learns instilling hope

Worth Saving

It was supposed to be great news for India's women when a prestigious medical institute touted sex-determination testing in 1974: Now mothers wouldn't have to keep having babies until they produced that coveted boy child.

Only one flaw in that thinking: It means millions of female fetuses have been aborted since then while officials pursued population control and traditional society favored dowry-attracting sons over dowry-costing daughters. The truly good news is that India outlawed dowries in 1961 and that Prime Minister Manmohan Singh last year labeled infanticide a "national disgrace," urging action to save baby girls. The ongoing bad news, though, is that dowries are still popular and more costly than ever and that a leading activist says government isn't doing much to crack down on feticide.

The unequal and often deadly treatment doesn't stop with babies, either. The BBC reported the story of Kulwant, a mother of three daughters whose family forced her to have three abortions before she finally delivered a son. She said her in-laws threatened that her husband would leave her if she didn't have a son and even tried to set her on fire.

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The BBC quoted Kulwant as recalling her first abortion this way: "The baby was nearly five months old. She was beautiful. I miss her, and the others we killed."

Of course, India is far from being the only country struggling with certain traditions that continue to be disastrous for women. China's one-child policy is cited as the reason it has a sex ratio more sharply skewed against girl babies than that of any other nation, second place going to its giant neighbor to the south. At the top of the list explaining such skewed ratios are infanticide and feticide, along with abuse and neglect of girl children.

In many Arab societies, traditions of patriarchy, honor

and tribal identity are bound up in legal systems run by authoritarian regimes. The effect is seen in hundreds of Arab proverbs belittling women as having "half a mind, half a creed, half an inheritance," according to Time magazine.

Since going on the air in India in 2005, *Women of Hope* has addressed this and many other issues as the broadcast grew to encompass seven languages. The program's vital contributions to the global struggle against gender inequality are made possible by supporters of Project Hannah and by prayer intercessors around the world.

Girls still are less likely to be in school than boys. Two out of three illiterate adults are women. Every 90 seconds of every day, a woman dies in pregnancy or childbirth. Violence against women and girls remains a global pandemic, violating women's rights and perpetuating harm in every country and community. HOPE AND HARMONY

Ask the Ari women of Ethiopia how marriage is supposed to work. Is it just a social formality in which anything goes as long as one partner – usually the man – is satisfied?

Cultural norms certainly differ from place to place, the Ari women may say, but that doesn't mean mothers and their children will thrive however much the family structure is contorted. Project Hannah's Ethiopian team traveled to a remote village to hear firsthand from Ari speakers about the worst problems facing women. Ari is one of three *Women of Hope* languages in Ethiopia.

"Many women cried because of polygamy, and we cried with them," the team wrote. "... They openly discussed the harmful traditions of their culture."

Polygamy undermines the family in numerous ways. Men spend lots of money on new brides stretching limited financial resources even thinner. Intimate relationships become impossible. A husband can't love two wives or 14 wives the same way he would love one, the team was told.

And the problems get worse. Men often resort to beating their wives, and some wives retaliate, killing their husbands and ending up in prison. Having multiple sexual partners increases the likelihood of HIV and other diseases being spread. Finally, when mothers can no longer feed their little ones properly and families are forced out of their homes, the

children may be scattered or sold off as laborers.

Project Hannah seeks to learn all it can about issues such as these facing women around the world so that it can reach out to them with physical and spiritual answers through radio broadcasts and local prayer groups. In fact, the Ari ministry centers on distributing handheld devices that play audio programs aimed at preventing fistulas, a debilitating condition that often results from early pregnancy or poor maternity care. In one village, the team visited a fistula patient who had been married at the age of 8.

Along with the steps toward aiding fistula sufferers, the team reported encouraging news regarding the enlistment of men to help raise women's status. After presenting Project Hannah's goals to classes of male theology students, who then asked biblically based questions about the ministry, team members were pleased to hear many of the men vow to support the equality of women.

"To restore women's hope, we have to work hard so that a man should humble himself and lift up women so that they will live in harmony," the Ethiopian Project Hannah team reported.
